

APPENDIX E

Sites of Sibao Bookselling and the Zou and Ma Booksellers

Compiled from the genealogies and interviews, these lists of Sibao bookselling sites and of the booksellers who worked those sites are necessarily tentative. Where I am not reasonably certain that a man was selling books (despite the insistence of my informants), I indicate my doubt. And where I am unsure of a place-name, I have inserted a question mark.

These lists dramatically underrepresent the number of Sibao booksellers. In most cases, the Zou and Ma genealogies provide information about bookselling sites only for publisher-booksellers with biographies, funerary inscriptions (*muzhiming* 墓誌銘), or other celebratory essays (e.g., *shouwen* 壽文), certainly a small fraction of the total. Moreover, these texts often do not mention a specific site; they simply note that their subject was a sojourning bookseller. Such men are not included on these lists.

The charts are organized by prefecture, county, and market town (or village). In identifying the places, I have relied on the 1820 maps from Tan Qixiang's *Zhongguo lishi ditu ji*, vol. 8, *Qing shiqi*; modern places-names are identified as such. A number in parentheses after a place-name indicates its ranking in the hierarchy of central places (drawn from Gilbert Rozman, *Urban Networks in Ch'ing China and Tokugawa Japan*, pp. 230–52).

*An asterisk by a place-name indicates that it was a site of Zou or Ma (non-bookselling) migration (see Appendix C). The following abbreviations are used for names of provinces: FJ, Fujian; GD, Guangdong; GX, Guangxi; HB, Hubei; HG, Huguang; HN, Hunan; JS, Jiangsu; JX, Jiangxi; ZJ, Zhejiang. LZ and SX refer to sections of the genealogies: *Liezhuan* 列傳 (biographies) and *Shixi* 世系 (generational tables), respectively. The following abbreviations are used for the sources:

As it frequently unambiguously means the latter in the Zou and Ma genealogies, I generally take it to include both the Lingnan provinces. But in cases where I am not certain that Guangxi is included, I have added a question mark.
